Rinsed out plastic containers numbers 1-7, including detergent, shampoo/conditioner, and drink bottles. Keep lids attached when possible.



Plastic Films and Bags

Plastic films and plastic bags are not recyclable because there is no regional market for that material.

Additionally, bags tangle the recycling equipment, which halts the sorting line. All recycling should be loose and not bagged; bags ruin recycling!



Glass Items

Glass can only be recycled at the City's 5 recycling dropoff centers. Do not recycle glass in curbside cart as it contaminates all other recyclables, damages the sorting equipment, and isn't a marketable product after breaking up and co-mingling with trash and debris in the sorting line.
